

Guideline for a selected nursing phenomenon study

A selected nursing phenomenon study provides an opportunity for a Master's student in adult nursing to summarize characteristics, causes or related factors to the selected concept/phenomenon in adults at all ages and in a variety of state of illness (healthy, high risk or those with illness, in acute, chronic, critically ill, dying, or encounter disaster). Students have to explore characteristics of the selected concept/phenomenon, identify causes or related factors to that selected concept/phenomenon. In addition, students need to identify the methods and tools to be used to determine that selected concept or phenomenon and analyze evidence-based nursing interventions. This activity will help the student to become an expert in a certain area. Each student has an advisor that will make an appointment to discuss and consult throughout the study.

Outlines for a selected nursing phenomenon report

The following is an example of a selected nursing concept/phenomenon report. Students may need to modify this guideline with suggestion of advisors to appropriately fit the contents of the report that consist of:

- 1. Background and significance of the selected concept/phenomenon that is needed to be addressed for better nursing care practice
- 2. Objectives of the study
- 3. Study methodology containing essential details of each step
- 4. Study results
 - 4. 1 Assessment tools to assess the selected phenomenon
 - 4. 2 A set of evidence-based nursing interventions of the selected phenomenon
 - 4.3 Outcome evaluation tools after implementing the established evidence-based nursing interventions, focusing on positive health outcomes of patient
 - 4.4 Summarize characteristics, causes and related factors of that selected concept/phenomenon, tools used to assess that concept and nursing intervention to overcome the nursing problem(s) related to that selected concept/phenomenon, and study outcomes.
 - 4.5 Implications to clinical nursing practices
- 5. Summary, lesson learned and recommendation
- 6. References and/or bibliography
- 7. Appendices
 - 5.1 Evidence-based table
 - 5.2 Tool related to the concept which you plan to utilize in clinical practice
 - 5.3 Protocol of research evidence utilization that you are going to implement in the practicum course.

The regulations of giving graduate students feedback
